5 best tips to help new catechists

upporting new catechists is an ongoing aspect of religious education programs. Help them become successful at handing on the faith by providing them with simple, clear descriptions of what you expect from them. Also, offer ways that you and the parish will support them in this role. Here are five activities that provide an apprenticeship environment for novice catechists. These suggestions will help them develop a healthy mindset, increase their knowledge, and aquire techniques to enrich their service.

Guide: Create a handbook describing standard operating procedures or make a checklist of routine tasks catechists are expected to complete.

Expand: Connect folks from dother parish ministries with the new catechists by asking parish groups such as the Men and Ladies Societies to pray for new catechists by name.

Model: Create lesson plans for • the first two learning sessions to illustrate what you consider good preparation for teaching.

Mentor: Dedicate specific times 4 and places for experienced catechists to interact with new catechists.

Supervise: Schedule periodic observations of sessions led by new catechists; follow this with verbal and written feedback focused on what you observed.

Ultimately, it's the Holy Spirit who helps each catechist nurture the growth in the seeds of faith God has already planted in the hearts of those we teach. The catechetical leader works with the Holy Spirit to develop the being, knowing, and skills of new catechists as artisans of Christian discipleship.

This spiralbound 250-page book highlights religious feasts and


